

Visit Canyon de Chelly

Canyon de Chelly National Monument is one of those places almost everyone has heard of but only a handful of folks have actually visited. Let's change that.

Two rim drives offer stunning vistas. Sheer cliffs plunge hundreds of feet to lush bottomlands lined with corn crops, pastures and cottonwoods. It's a staggering blend of high drama and pastoral beauty. Canyon de Chelly shelters thousands of archaeological sites and dozens of Navajo families who still live and farm there during warmer months.

The North Rim Drive is 17 miles with three overlooks at prominent cliff dwellings. The South Rim Drive (19 miles) with seven viewpoints is even more spectacular. At White House Overlook, visitors can hike into the canyon along a beautiful trail (2.5 miles round trip) that switchbacks down the sandstone wall for a close-up look at an ancient multitiered pueblo.

Further exploration requires a guided group tour or a Navajo guide for jeep, horseback or hiking outings. Tours leave daily from Thunderbird Lodge in the park. A four-hour tour costs \$70;928-674-5842, www.thunderbirdlodge.com. You'll also find registered tour operators near the visitor center.




Making The Grade


Signs warning that there is a "grade" ahead, otherwise known to most of us as a hill, can be difficult to interpret if not confusing. What is this sign telling me? Just how steep is this hill? Seeing a higher percent number would, of course, mean a steeper hill. Since the information is posted in percentages instead of degrees one would think that 100% would be the total of something, like straight up, right? Wrong! Zero percent is level but 100%, in grade language, is 45 degrees. It is extremely unlikely that one would encounter a 45 degree or a 100% grade anywhere on America's highways. These warning signs are primarily intended for trucks and semis especially those carrying heavy loads. For us they mean there may be slower moving vehicles ahead and we may need to apply our bakes more cautiously to avoid them overheating and perhaps experience brake fade or even failure. Brake fade is when they become overheated to the point that even though you are applying more pressure they seem to glide, not effectively slowing you as though there is oil on them. So, if you see a sign that indicates a 18% or 20% grade or more, get ready; you may be going down hill fast.

Woman Breaks World Record 11,235 Mile Motorcycle Expedition



NEW BETHLEHEM, PA – July 1, 2016 – (<u>Motor Sports Newswire</u>) – Deena Mastracci never says no to a new challenge. Refusing to be outdone by her fiancé, professional endurance driver Carl Reese, (who set the fastest time on a motorcycle from Los Angeles to New York), Mastracci decided to set her own long distance motorcycle record; but first, she needed a motorcycle license, no easy feat in itself.

Mastracci's cross-country trip of more than 11,000 miles began June 1 in Santa Clarita, California. She had no prior on-road experience other than that gained at a one-day class at Street-masters Motorcycle Workshops—on a closed racetrack—as part of her preparation and a Motorcycle Safety Class given at the local college for her motorcycle test. The coast-to-coast ride by way of the Arctic Circle was no vacation as Mastracci encountered a variety of challenging road conditions, including snow, mud, ice, 50 mph wind, flooded roads and golf ball sized grav-

el. Her route included the full length of the Dalton Highway (one of the world's most dangerous roads), a treacherous road that leads to Dead Horse, Alaska over the Brooks Mountain Range. Her journey included pit stops in Prudhoe Bay, Alaska; Denver, Colorado; Brookfield, Connecticut; and Grand Rapids, Michigan before concluding in New Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. Mastracci covered an average of 400 miles per day. During the third week of her journey, she travelled 1,000 miles from Denver, Colorado to Hammond, Indiana within a 24-hour time period, a feat that is only attempted by the most seasoned riders, often referred to as an "Ironbutt Challenge."

Mastracci's total mileage of 11,236 miles surpassed the previous record of 9,000 miles held by Clif Chu set back on July 23, 2012. Clif's journey was witnessed by William Schoetteler.

Mastracci's very first motorcycle ride was not only a successful attempt to set a record for "Longest Distance Traveled by a New Motorcycle Licensee," but was also a way to bring attention to the work of the Motorcycle Relief Project, a nonprofit charity that helps veterans with PTSD and other injuries. The group arranges multi-day motorcycle tours and other activities and also offers counseling for veterans in an effort to decrease suicides. Additionally, Mastracci hoped her ride would inspire other women who may feel intimidated by driving a motorcycle.

"My journey was the trip of a lifetime: a terrifyingly beautiful ride and an incredible learning experience all in one," said Mastracci. "Everything about the voyage was a challenge for me. From navigating in traffic to maneuvering through mud and ice, it was very tough. While challenging, this journey was nothing compared to the trials that our armed forces face on a daily basis, which is why the work that the Motorcycle Relief Project does is so important to me."

Reese, who followed Mastracci on the journey on a separate motorcycle as a safety precaution, said, "It was remarkable to see how Deena evolved as a rider over the course of her journey. Going from no on-road experience to tackling more than 11,000 miles over the course of 27 days is nothing short of epic! I am so proud of her for taking on and conquering such a challenge." No stranger to setting records, Mastracci (together with Reese and Rodney Hawk) already holds the Guinness World Record for the "Shortest Charging Time Cross-Country Trip in an Electric Vehicle" and as part of Reese's driving team, has helped set records for the "Fastest Time for Crossing the USA in an Electric Vehicle (EV)" and for a "Double Transcontinental Trip (LA-NYC-LA)." She holds a total of five EV records all set with a Tesla P85 D. Whether as a couple or individually, Mastracci and Reese are always seeking to accomplish new driving feats. For this record attempt, Mastracci rode a used F800GT BMW motorcycle purchased at West Valley Cycle Sales in Los Angeles, CA, the oldest BMW Motorrad Dealer in the United States. This attempt was Mastracci's first individual record, and has been submitted to Guinness World Records book for formal verification.



Historic Female Riders

Adeline & Augusta van Buren

Facts: These two sisters were the first women to navigate Pikes Peak on a motorized vehicle of any kind and are often billed as the first women to ride solo motorcycles across the United States. They were inducted into the AMA Motorcycle Hall of Fame in 2002. And Sturgis Hall of Fame in 2003.

In 1916 these two affluent sisters from New York set out to prove that women should be used as dispatch riders in the war effort and in order to prove their potential, decided to ride across the United States. Adeline and Augusta came from an active family so it wasn't a real shock

when they showed up on a pair of new Indian Power Plus motorcycles, hell bent on proving women can ride as well as men. Unlike the Hotchkiss women, they were intent on making a point. In orderto show they had the moxie and skill to handle the grueling demands of riding bikes long distances, they set out on their own 5,500 mile ride to San Francisco on July 4, 1916. The route took them through Chicago, into Colorado and Utah with many stops both voluntary and involuntary along the way.

They faced harsh terrain of the unimproved roads that connected the two coasts in addition to harassment from law enforcement and folks discriminating against them for just being female. According to their Hall of Fame bio they were even arrested for wearing men's riding clothes on a couple occasions. In Colorado, they made their official mark in the history books by becoming the first women to summit the 14,000 tall Pikes Peak hill climb (just for fun, not in any type of competition). In fact they were the first females to accomplish the task in any type of modern conveyance for that matter. Their three month long transcontinental mission was accomplished on September 2. The fanfare in the media surrounding their effort made the ride seem more like a vacation than a political statement or historical achievement it was intended for. Afterwards, it was no surprise, Adeline's application to join the military was still rejected, but the point had been made. Women are awesome. While Adeline went on to become a lawyer in NYC, Augusta became a pilot and joined the female flying club called the 99s, which was started by Amelia Earhart. The 99s were considered the inspiration for the Motor Maids MC Club.

IRVINE, CA – February 13, 2017 – Bonnier Motorcycle Group today announced a newly redesigned Motorcyclist magazine with the launch of the publication's March/April issue, scheduled to hit newsstands February 28. In order to support its dedicated readers, Motorcyclist will move to a thicker paper stock and enlarged size. In addition, Motorcyclist will have increased pages and will be offered in six issues per year, allowing for the magazine to focus on expanded feature stories with engaging photographic spreads.

"I have been reading Motorcyclist magazine since I was a child, so this relaunch was very important to me," said VP, Group Publisher Andy Leisner. "The new Motorcyclist had to present motorcycling in a way to inspire people to buy motorcycles and ride, just like how it influenced me. The new format, quality, and presentation does this by showcasing our sport with style, class and excitement."

Motorcyclist is the oldest continually-published motorcycle magazine in the world, with its first issue going to print in 1912. As the magazine enters a new era, Zack Courts and Ari Henning will share Executive Editor responsibilities in leading the brand.

"We didn't take this redesign lightly," Courts said. "We know the readers have come to count on this magazine for the true enthusiasts' view of motorcycling. We've chased stories and photos from around the world for this issue. That's our plan now: find the most interesting snapshots of two-wheeled culture and deliver them to people with great imagery and imaginative storytelling. Motorcycles are a huge part of our life, and we think the readers will be able to feel that every time they turn the page."

The first edition of the relaunched magazine will include articles on subjects as varied as the story of the grandfather of the popular Adventure-bike category, the 1981 BMW R80 G/S, as well as an in-depth profile of the man behind the strident designs of KTM.

History International Female Ride Day

The concept of International Female Ride Day[©] (IFRD) was rooted in a much earlier idea by its founder but finally came to reality with its introduction in Canada on that first Friday in May, 2007. It is the sole brain child of motorcyclist <u>Vicki Gray</u>, owner and founder of MOTORESS[®] an avid globally known motorcycling advocate. It was promoted initially as a national event with the intent of becoming an International campaign. But in its initial year, the "JUST RIDE![©]" idea caught fire and went global.

Women motorcycle riders in Canada, across the United States, The Netherlands and Australia joined in. It was immediately embraced by thousands of women riders making its introduction truly an international success. Its achievements continue to drive it forward today, now a decade later and permanently etched into every woman rider's agenda – now the first Saturday in May.

"The day was born with the purpose of emphasizing the fact that many women ride and enjoy motorcycling at all levels. My initiative of implementing a day where female motorcyclists simply got on their motorcycles and rode would truly underline this fact", stated Vicki

Gray.

International Female Ride Day[©] additionally promotes women in motorcycling and encourages other women to take up the activity. The numbers of women motorcycle riders steadily increases, and certainly more so in recent decades (women's social values have changed, advanced, etc.)

International Female Ride Day[©] provides a platform for women riders to bond with other women, develop friendships and continue to enjoy motorcycling!" exclaims Gray.

In its conceptual design, step one was to introduce the campaign under the principle of a synchronized day where women globally would simply "JUST RIDE![©]". Ms Gray recalled similar successful campaigns such as "Live Aid" the famed coordinated music concerts to help HIV/Aids. Also the successful American motorcycle safety campaign "Ride to Work Day". These global actions combined with a long-term goal of becoming a standard in women rider's lives just as "mother's day" has become.
