SAFETY CONCERNS

Roger Deevers, Safety Officer LINES



The one thing that has perhaps saved more lives than anything else for the driving public has been the painted lines on the road. The center line being the one most effective. Those lines painted on the roads and highways have been there for the entirety of our lives. The story of the original line may have some myth connected with it. "It was a

painter's truck who had a container to paint tip over and the paint spilled on the rear tire leaving a line down the middle the road. Drivers used that line as a reference to stay on their side of the road." A good story but not the official one: 'The first lined road in the United States was Trenton's River Road in Wayne County, Michigan, which dates back to 1911. Edward Hines, at the time the chairman of the Wayne County Board of Roads, came up with the idea after watching a leaky milk truck make its way down the road, according to the Michigan Department of Transportation. Hines was posthumously inducted into the Michigan Transportation Hall of Honor for the idea in 1972.' Since the first application of paint to pavement, a career emerged titled "Traffic Engineer."

Traffic engineering is a branch of civil engineering that uses engineering techniques to achieve the safe and efficient movement of people and goods on roadways. It focuses mainly on research for safe and efficient traffic flow, such as road geometry, sidewalks and crosswalks, cycling infrastructure, traffic signs, road surface markings and traffic lights. Traffic engineering deals with the functional part of transportation system, except the infrastructures provided. Thinking back to my younger years the white and yellow lines were just paint. Some ingenious individual came up with the idea of making the lines more reflective by including glass beads in the paint which made a remarkable difference at night. Traffic engineers have done an excellent job of designing road markings that are usually easy to interpret. However the design and specifications are handed off to someone else to carry out the application. On an ordinary basis those "road painters" do a pretty good job. But once in a while we come across an area where the lines on the road are confusing and near impossible to follow leaving us, after getting through the area, to mentally say, "WHAT? WHY? Where the painters confused too?" Whether it was spilled paint or leaking milk, following the resulting lines and evolution of markings on the road has indeed made our riding experience much safer.

"AMA Vintage Motorcycle Days is recognized as one of the country's premier motorcycling festivals, celebrating the illustrious history of motorcycling in this country. "The sheer size of this event and the excitement of the people attending are energizing," Massey said. "You can spend three days here and still not experience everything that's available." AMA Vintage Motorcycle Days raises funds for the nonprofit AMA Motorcycle Hall of Fame. Begun in 1990, the event has been held at Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course since 1995. The track and its surrounding grounds are a superb location for the event, accommodating road racing, trials, hare scrambles and motocross, in addition to a Paul Yaffe's Through The Years Motorcycle Retrospective Big Hit at Arizona Bike Week

PHOENIX, AZ – April 14, 2017 – A retrospective exhibit celebrating legendary custom motorcycle builder Paul Yaffe's storied career was on display at the Legends Pavilion for the duration of Arizona Bike Week 2017. Sponsored by Chuck Franklin Law, Yaffe Through the Years showcased 19 of the most spectacular bikes that Paul has created during his 26 years in the bike building and custom parts business. Tens of thousands of people cycled through throughout the week, taking in photos and testimonies and witnessing firsthand and up close the beauty and power of Paul Yaffe's metal masterpieces. "It all started with a love of motorcycles and a curiosity and desire to see what could be made of them," says Paul. "I never would have guessed, when I first started experimenting in the mid eighties, that it would have led to where we are today." An amazing collection of some of Paul's most memorable custom creations was on display, featuring bikes from all around the country, including one of his take on an aluminum FXR from 1995. A longtime Hamster, Paul also helped organize and participated in the Seventh Annual Hamster's

Beginning at Paul Yaffe's Bagger Nation, the ride stretched for 60 miles, winding through some of the most beautiful desert terrain Arizona has to offer, and culminating at Arizona Bike Week for a concert with Creedence Clearwater Revisited. But people were really taken with the Paul Yaffe Through The Years exhibit. "We did a smaller event as part of my birthday celebration late last year," says Paul. "But we expanded the concept, added about twice as many bikes, more photos, artwork and memorabilia. Plus, it was really special to hold the event here in Phoenix, where I opened my first shop so many years ago." That first shop was American Legend Motorcycle Co., which



opened in 1991. Since then, Paul has enjoyed one of the most illustrious and influential careers in motorcycle designing and building. Today, Paul Yaffe's Bagger Nation, together with Paul Yaffe Originals, is recognized as one of—if not the—preeminent custom bike building outfits.

About Paul Yaffe Paul Yaffe has been designing and building custom motorcycles and motorcycle parts and accessories for over 30 years. In that time, he has won many awards, contests and honors, including three "World's Most Beautiful Motorcycle" awards at the famous Oakland Roadster Show and two "Builder of the Year" and three "Trendsetter of the Year" honors from Easyriders Magazine. Paul opened his custom shop Paul Yaffe's Bagger Nation (together with Paul Yaffe Originals) twenty-five years ago, and today his designs are recognized as being among the best and most sought after in the world. LOS CARACOLES PASS, CHILE

While the main highway from the Argentinean town of Mendoza up the Andes to the Chilean border in the shadow of Aconcagua (6961m) is a series of steps, from the border post at 3200 metres the road plummets down towards Santiago de Chile.
